Chitting Potatoes

From late January/ February place your seed potatoes in a tray or shallow box (empty egg cartons are really good) in a cool, bright, frost free position to allow them to sprout. The sprouts usually form at one end (called the rose end). Place the rose end upwards. The sprouts or 'chits' will turn green and the potato will be ready to plant after 6 weeks when the chits are about 2cms. Chitting encourages faster growth and heavier crops once the potatoes are in the ground.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Protect yourself from tetanus by visiting your doctor for a tetanus injection. Tetanus is caused by bacteria that live in soil and is a very serious infection that can be caught via a cut or even a graze.

Wear suitable clothing especially shoes. Toes can be easily damaged with forks and spades! '

Prevent major muscle aches and back strain by working on the allotment 'a little and often'

Carry a mobile phone. Although it is nice to be alone at the allotment, it is best to have your phone in the event of an emergency.

Read labels carefully when using any weed or bug killers. Do not rinse containers in the water tanks.

Keep your plot clear of trip hazards and store sharp objects safely. This is especially important on paths, as other tenants may walk along the side of your plot to get to theirs.
